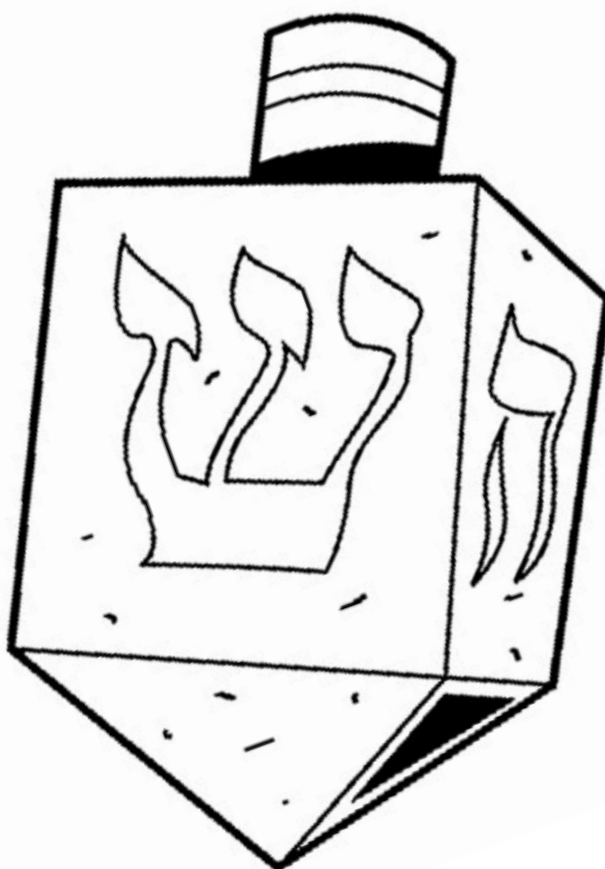

Dear Friends,

Jewish mysticism teaches us to look beneath the surface of everyday reality and try and see the magic and miracles implicit in all that surrounds us. Easier said than done, I should say.

• Some things just don't present as blessings, do they?

• On a recent gray rainy day I paid a restaurant tab and as I turned to leave the establishment I grumbled aloud to the cashier regarding what I was about to face weather-wise. He looked at me quizzically and said, "It's a beautiful day." It was one of those moments where you vacillate between such emotions as "this guy is nuts," or "wait a minute, I actually am rather fond of inclement weather and rain is a blessing..."

• There are people and instances that snap you back into that way of thinking. And then there is ritual. Chanukah, for example, helps us in our capacity to view the miraculous. Consider that all year long we use light to view other things. We read by light, drive at night with our headlights, use lights as beacons for direction, and turn on our house-lights increasingly early as the winter approaches. But as we kindle the lights of our Menorah we are bidden to focus on the light itself and not use it for some other purpose. The idea is to fill our eyes with the light of Chanukah, the presence of the miraculous (whether it is an astounding victory for religious freedom or a lamp that lasted seven days longer than expected), so that when the holiday has passed we will be energized with an ongoing ability to see our lives and all the beautiful things around us with

an increased sensitivity. Often, the best way to embrace the miraculous nature of existence is to refrain from looking upon something only for its capacity to serve us, to be used. Enjoy the flame as a symbol of light for light's sake.

Albert Einstein once said, "There are two ways of looking at the world – either you see nothing as a miracle or you see everything as a miracle." During the historical period which Chanukah commemorates, the most impressive difference between the ruling Greeks and the Jews was that the Greeks considered the notion of the "miraculous" as absurd while the Jews saw everything as miraculous. That's one of the reasons we are, and always have been, visionaries. We see potential where others see only the mundane.

The famous biblical book of Ecclesiastes teases us with the verse, "there is nothing new under the sun." What he meant was that if you only look at things in terms of their reflected physical light then yes, nothing will seem new to you under that big illuminating ball of gas. But the Zohar teaches us that everything can be seen as new when you are using light that is beyond the sun. Chanukah's light is beyond the sun. If you gaze at the flames as lights to be used for physical guidance, nothing they shed light on will be particularly new. But when we understand them as symbols of the miraculous, then everything you see will appear miraculous.

And it is.

Lighting the Way

Finding help when it is needed most

Dorothy Raizes battled the odds to give her son a good education and a solid Jewish identity at a time when programs and services for people with disabilities were nearly nonexistent.

Dorothy and Leon Raizes's son, Bruce, was born prematurely in the early 1950s in Mason City, Iowa, and early environmental factors resulted in his partial blindness. When the family learned that the Minneapolis public school system was mainstreaming children with sight impairments, they moved with their 5-year-old son Bruce to Minneapolis.

Sadly, Leon died of cancer within a few years of their move, and Dorothy knew she would need to raise her son and teach him about Judaism on her own. On October 4, 1960, she and Bruce became members of Temple Israel, and Bruce began Religious School. But it was not the highly inclusive school that Temple is known for today.

Mitzvah. Dorothy took charge and hired a private tutor who helped him memorize his Torah and Haftarah portions. Thanks to Dorothy's advocacy and initiative, Bruce became a Bar Mitzvah in May 1965.

Dorothy was proud to be one of the original group of Temple members who participated in the massive project that Sisterhood took on in the 1950s – translating textbooks into Braille. After Bruce's confirmation, however, both Dorothy and Bruce stopped coming to Temple on a regular basis. They found social circles elsewhere, and Dorothy volunteered for other organizations that helped people with disabilities.

Fast forward to 2008 when Dorothy turned 90 and was becoming frail. She was in and out of hospitals and assisted living, when Temple Israel's congregational nurse, Jody Beck, reached out to her. "Mother thought Jody was an angel," Bruce said. "Mother said she couldn't have survived that year without her." Temple's nurse managed Dorothy's interaction with health care providers, took her to doctor appointments, acted as a liaison with assisted living staff, and much more.

"After years of very little contact with the congregation, Temple was there when we needed the help," Bruce said. "For that, we are grateful."

Dorothy died on Sept. 13, 2009. After her death, Temple Israel was notified that Dorothy had included Temple in her estate plans. Through this gift, and through Bruce's continued membership and increased involvement, Dorothy's legacy lives on. The estate gift in her name will always support the community that was there for her at the end.

"It was a challenge for Temple administration," Bruce said. "I was the first blind person to attend the Religious School. I never learned Hebrew because they couldn't figure out how to adapt the textbook." The school also had no idea how to prepare Bruce for a Bar
